
I awake each morning to a sheen of sun rising over the seasoaring seagulls seemingly etched into a distant Portofino

"Sapphire is embodied research and a performance project. It shares the journey of a timetraveling golden goddess moving through moments that police and celebrate the essence and experience of Black women in the United States. Told through an Afro-futuristic lens, this non-linear narrative displays humanity canvassed in an evolving constellation of identity. It pulsates through the objectified, the dehumanized, the powerful, and the magical. Sapphire (view an excerpt of the performance at Judson Church below) is a reflection to see you and see through you...a vessel of celestial intimacy, love, ferocity, grief, and audacity.



I was able to expand my artistic vision and process at Bogliasco. It cultivated space for me to develop Sapphire into an evening length presentation, invite people into my process, dream of short stories for Sapphire which I'm currently working on, and most importantly build a unique artistic community. I'm grateful to still be in contact with several of the fellows today."


David Dominique 2019 Fellow in Music, United States



"The past 3 1/2 weeks have delivered some of the most intense events, images and dialogs of our lifetimes, but I suspect that for each of us the nature of the intensity is quite different. The unending flow of news of Black death – including a recent under-reported spate of Black Americans found hanging from trees across the country just this month – has been heartbreaking, horrifying, maddening, infuriating, and nauseating.

At the same time, the swell of attention being paid to the general precarity of Black life in the US and globally, as well as attention on the many details that underwrite and uphold this precarity, has provided a glimmer of hope. Many friends and relatives have reached out to ask how I'm doing. Unable to answer with a simple 'I'm doing well/badly/ok' or 'what a time!' at a certain point I came up with a boilerplate response: 'I'm activated.'" <u>Read full text</u>.

[...] "As for my own humble artistic output, I will share with you my 2018 album for jazz ensemble, "Mask" as well as some <u>electronic video works-in-progress</u> from a new collaboration with Indianapolis artist Liz Wierzbicki. The former is a continuation of my three decades playing brass instruments and composing in various genres that use them (from jazz to reggae to ska and rock). The album is most often identified as jazz, but as you may hear, draws liberally from numerous genres including rock, electronic music, and contemporary classical.



The latter project is part of a newer exploration of modular synthesis, an expansion of the scope, means, and media of my output. These works were made by Wierzbicki and me in April and May of this year for a drive-in exhibition in Indianapolis (see photo).

My hope is that these efforts and considerations in video art can guide me toward uniting my art and more direct expressions of socioeconomic/racial politics, and that in a near future, I can blend my acoustic, electronic and political output into the same stew."

Kia Corthron was just awarded the 2020 Dramatist Guild's Flora Roberts Award which is presented annually to a playwright in recognition of distinguished work in the theatre and to encourage the continuation of that work. The advanced reader copy of Kia's debut novel The <u>Castle Cross the Magnet Carter</u> arrived during her Bogliasco residency in early fall of 2015. The novel, which was released early the next year, went on to win the 2016 Center for Fiction First Novel Prize and was a New York Times Book Review Editor's Choice. She has recently drafted her second novel Moon and the Mars.

"It's usual to say that the peace and quiet of a great residency was important for driving creativity. And yes, I appreciated the respite from 'the usual' during my time at the Bogliasco Study Center. But truthfully, it was also a time of personal challenges that I was determined to set aside. I thought of how remarkable it was to be present in this ancient Mediterranean space that's still alive to continuous converging and conflicting currents of history and culture. That humanism and creative tension has left its mark on my current work and is part of what has endeared me to this place forever."
